## **YorkCounts heads to William Penn for second town hall**

York, December 10, 2009 – YorkCounts will visit William Penn Senior High School Jan. 19 for the second in a series of town halls to engage York County residents in a conversation about the work of YorkCounts. The first three town halls, called “Kids, Truancy and a County at Risk,” will focus on the United Way of York County’s Stay in School Report, and especially Judge John Uhler’s Truancy Task Force work. The next town hall will be in February, to be hosted by Northeastern School District.

YorkCounts is partnering with York City School District to present this second town hall, which will start at 6:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium. Participants include Bob Woods, executive director of the United Way and a board member of YorkCounts; Judge Uhler, whose truancy work is becoming a model for Pennsylvania counties; and student representatives from York City schools. There will be periods for questions and dialogue. Service providers, including Big Brothers, Big Sisters; YWCA York; and YMCA of York and York County, will be invited to attend and distribute information related to their work with youth.

The United Way spent more than a year researching local programs and examining best practices from around the country to develop a plan to keep more York County youth in school. The study makes the case that a community would be better served by investing in kids early, instead of putting them in jail as adults.

“We learned that there are huge costs to letting these kids drop out,” Woods said. “Obviously, the kids are hurt because a lot of times they get in trouble and end up in the court system. But the entire community suffers, too – more crime, fewer people with employable skills, fewer people paying taxes, higher government costs for prisons and health care. Hopefully, these town halls will help people understand the scope of the problem.”

The Stay in School initiative developed as an engagement with YorkCounts in an effort to reduce dropout rates and improve high school graduation rates in York County. YorkCounts uses more than three dozen statistical benchmarks to try to measure the quality of life in York County. Graduation rates are one measure of the quality of the county’s public education.

“The United Way did a remarkable job putting together the numbers to show how significant dropout rates pose a real threat to our community,” said YorkCounts Director James DeBord. “And it’s a problem to some degree at every district in the county. We want to use the report and the town halls to show the

success these local programs have had on a small scale and help them reach more families to keep even more kids in school.”

Among the most important findings in the Stay in School Report:

- For the past 11 years, an average of four students every day dropped out of a York County school.
- Students who drop out of school are more than eight times as likely to be in jail or prison.
- The cost to incarcerate a York County resident for a year is three times the cost to educate a student in the public-school system for a year.

Judge Uhler said reducing truancy and keeping kids in school is the responsibility of the entire community.

“It is critical for York countians to have a heightened awareness of our substantial truancy and dropout rates within our schools,” Uhler said. “The negative impact of missing school and dropping out extends far beyond our students lack of an education. It damages the fabric of our community and its economic well being. We are all stakeholders in this problem. It is mandatory that sustainable collaborative partnerships be launched within York County to promote the value of an education and to address the truancy and dropout concerns.”
